#### TRUSTEES' REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2013

The trustees of National Numeracy are pleased to present their report and accounts for the period ended 31 December 2013.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the accounts and comply with the charity's Memorandum and Articles of Association, the Companies Act 2006 and the Statement of Recommended Practice, 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities', issued in March 2005.

#### Structure, governance and management

The charity is a company limited by guarantee which was incorporated on 19 December 2011. It was registered as a charity on 30 January 2012.

The trustees have full responsibility for all legal and financial matters. Any additions to the membership of the trustees follows invitation by the Board of Trustees after due consideration. New trustees receive a full and comprehensive briefing before their first meeting.

All the trustees give of their time freely and none of the trustees has any beneficial interest in the company. All of the trustees are members of the company and guarantee to contribute £1 in the event of a winding up. Two of the named trustees during this period, Wendy Jones and Lynn Churchman, also acted as part-time paid specialist consultants to National Numeracy. In this aspect National Numeracy has acted fully within the terms of its constitution and the Charities Act in agreeing to pay these two trustees, and the organisation has followed the Charity Reporting and Accounting Rules in its legal agreements with them both.

Trustees are required to disclose all relevant interests. Details of trustee expenses and related party transactions are disclosed in a note to the accounts.

#### Organisational structure

National Numeracy's trustees meet four times a year. In these meetings they agree the broad strategy and areas of activity for the charity, and cover other areas such as planning for growth and financial management.

In addition, the management group meets every six weeks. The management group consists of Lynn Churchman, Mike Ellicock, Sarah Gibb, Wendy Jones, Alison Plant (consultant) and Belinda Vernon.

Mike Ellicock is both Chief Executive and Company Secretary and is responsible for the day-to-day governance of the charity, including liaising with partner organisations.

There are also occasional advisory groups bringing together relevant experts, such as the pedagogy group. External advisers' attendance at these meetings is unpaid.

### TRUSTEES' REPORT (continued) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2013

#### Risk assessment

The trustees have assessed the major risks to which the charity is exposed, and are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate exposure to the major risks. A risk register is in place and key staff members have been assigned areas of responsibility and a schedule of regular assessments is in place.

#### Objectives and activities

The objectives of the charity are to promote education for the public benefit in mathematics and numeracy. The policies and activities adopted in furtherance of these objective are set out below. The trustees have paid due regard to guidance on public benefit issued by the Charity Commission in deciding what activities the charity should undertake.

#### Achievements and performance

#### Progress in 2013 and the year ahead

National Numeracy was established to bring an unrelenting spotlight onto the importance of numeracy for adults and children across the UK, in the knowledge that everyone can improve their everyday maths skills provided they receive the right support and make a sustained effort. After a very promising inaugural year, National Numeracy grew as an organisation during 2013, expanded its activities and spread its message to yet more audiences. We have developed new partnerships and forms of collaborative working, and have now launched our first major long-term project designed to have a practical impact on low levels of numeracy. Below is a summary of our achievements during our second year and a look ahead to 2014.

#### **Practical projects**

After an encouraging first year, 2013 was the year that National Numeracy hit its stride in developing practical projects. The biggest of these was the National Numeracy Challenge, a five-year UK-wide project aiming to improve the numeracy of a million adults, through working in partnership with public and private sector employers, TUC Unionlearn, community and education organisations.

At the heart of this project is an interactive website – the Challenge Online – which allows people to test their own numeracy, gives them a detailed assessment and suggests learning resources to help in areas needing improvement. Users are encouraged to re-assess their numeracy after undertaking learning in order to measure their progress. As a basis for the Challenge Online, we completed work on the Essentials of Numeracy (see the section on Research and Evidence), a key part of our 2013 objectives.

During the year, the concept and development materials were presented to a wide range of employers, education bodies and outreach organisations and won the support of key partners. We partnered with 54 different organisations to pilot the Challenge Online and 1,500 people participated. In response to feedback, we revised and improved the Challenge Online and in particular the diagnostic tool, the 'Challenge Check-up', and introduced further learning resources. Following this, we prepared to launch the Challenge to the wider public in March 2014. Key support for the project came from our lead partner and core funder, the Nationwide Building Society. Funds for developing the Challenge were received from NIACE, with additional funding from the Mercers' Charitable Foundation and continuing support from the Rayne Foundation.

National Numeracy also continued its work with eight London primary schools in the second year of Raising Achievement, a three-year pilot project to improve the engagement and progress of children aged 7 to 9. The project funders, The John Lyon's Charity, expressed satisfaction with the end-of-academic-year report and the next phase began with increased numbers of participating schools.

After successfully securing funding from the Paul Hamlyn Foundation, we were able to begin work on two interrelated projects: Firm Foundations for All, which will provide practical support and resources for those with the very lowest levels of numeracy, and Parental Engagement, which will help parents to play a more positive part in supporting their children with maths. Expert panels and a series of focus groups were established for both projects by the end of 2013.

The summer months saw National Numeracy join the BBC for its CBeebies Summer Tour, which offered learning opportunities to families with young children. It lasted for nine weeks, travelled to eight locations across the UK and reached over 123,000 people. The popular children's TV personality Mr Bloom was the 'headliner' with other CBeebies characters there to draw in the crowds. Learning opportunities underpinned everything that the tour delivered and National Numeracy played a strong role in ensuring this. Our contribution was led by Bryony Crutcher, a qualified primary school teacher with previous event management and presenting experience, who developed the idea of delivering maths on the tour through an exercise and fitness theme.

Team members sought feedback from parents on their attitudes and beliefs in relation to maths, and gained valuable insights. Maths challenge cards were created as a hand-out for the children, with simple maths activities to do at home. As well as providing fun for the children, these proved helpful reminders to parents of practical everyday maths activities they could do with their children. A further information and advice booklet was available for parents. BBC Learning reported the CBeebies tour as their most successful yet and commented on National Numeracy's important contribution.

#### Communications and influence

During 2013, National Numeracy continued to have regular contact with officials at Whitehall government departments (Business, Innovation and Skills, Education and Work and Pensions) and established contact with devolved administrations, with meetings in Glasgow, Cardiff and Belfast. Meetings were held with Skills and Enterprise Minister, Matthew Hancock, and with a range of MPs and peers. National Numeracy provided evidence to MPs for the debate on adult skills in the House of Commons, responded to relevant government consultations and was quoted by the Department for Education (DfE) in a news release on the post-16 maths curriculum.

We expanded our range of contacts in education, business and the third sector, increasing interest in the issue of numeracy and bringing in new support for National Numeracy. We gained significant endorsements for our work from a number of high-profile 'ambassadors' in the media and in business.

During 2013 National Numeracy was represented at a wide range of conferences and seminars and we made many presentations on our work and issues related to numeracy to a variety of audiences. We actively supported the Maths4Us campaign led by NIACE, and established a new Numeracy Forum, aimed at spreading ideas among all those with an interest in maths and numeracy; the inaugural meeting was held in December.

We continued to attract media interest, particularly in relation to World Maths Day, our response to the DfE consultation on the national curriculum and the OECD PIAAC survey. We were quoted in various press articles and interviewed on BBC TV and Radio and we wrote pieces for specialist and online publications. We also expanded the National Numeracy website and developed and distributed new marketing literature.

### TRUSTEES' REPORT (continued) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2013

#### Research and evidence

During the year we completed and published the Essentials of Numeracy for All, which defines the mathematical understanding and skills needed in everyday life. This underpins our practical projects, including the National Numeracy Challenge.

Another important tool developed was a model for measuring improvement – or 'distance travelled' – as part of the Challenge. This will be vitally important in giving weight to the data produced by the Challenge project and will help inform subsequent activities.

We also held a series of focus groups with teachers, parents, young people and adult learners throughout the country in order to give us new insights into people's perceptions of maths and numeracy.

National Numeracy responded to relevant national and global evidence published throughout the year, including the PIAAC and PISA reports, published by the OECD. These reports were among many summarised and commented on on our website, which over the course of the year markedly increased its traffic with 134,494 visits to the site of which 77% were new visitors. New 'infographics' were also introduced on the site with the aim of providing clear graphical explanations of the issues.

A second YouGov poll on attitudes to maths and numeracy was commissioned and the results published and shared with our partners. This form of market research is an ongoing contribution to our understanding of people's approaches towards maths and numeracy and their perceptions of how the subjects affect their lives.

National Numeracy also began discussions with the Cabinet Office's Behavioural Insights Team on developing new ways to encourage people to improve their numeracy. This research will inform and be informed by the Challenge and could help us to reach those most in need of improved numeracy.

#### Organisation and funding

During 2013 National Numeracy received funding towards core activities from the Rothschild Foundation and ongoing support from the Nationwide Building Society, the Mercers' Charitable Foundation and the Man Charitable Trust.

In line with our strategic plans, we established a trading arm, National Numeracy Solutions Ltd (NNS), which in turn acquired the maths education consultancy, training and school improvement business, National Mathematics Partnership. This is allowing us to start to expand our practical work in schools and colleges and begin a consultancy project for the Welsh government, developing training and support materials for teachers and school leaders on the topic of numerical reasoning – NNS's first major commission.

In the latter part of the year we began discussions to find a new Chair to replace our founding Chair, Chris Humphries CBE, who wished to step down for personal and family reasons but who remains on the board. The trustees and staff wish to record their gratitude for Chris's energy and inspiring leadership during National Numeracy's first two years. We were pleased to announce that Chris's successor is David Frost CBE DL, who was formally appointed to the Board and chairmanship in January 2014.

The range of activities embarked on or committed to in 2013 required an increase in staffing at our Lewes headquarters. Key new members of staff were added to the small team and structural adjustments made to the management.

### TRUSTEES' REPORT (continued) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2013

#### Plans for 2014

The current year looks set to be a productive and exciting one for National Numeracy. Planned 2014 activity includes:

- Launch the National Numeracy Challenge on 12 March: with support from Nationwide Building Society and our other partners, we aim to achieve significant public interest. We will continue to promote the Challenge and expand participation, and consider how to extend reach into new areas. We will begin to track overall progress.
- Support the launch and early work of a new All Party Parliamentary Group on Maths and Numeracy: we have accepted an invitation to fulfil a co-secretariat role (with the Institute of Chartered Accountants in England and Wales) for this new group. This invitation represents considerable recognition for a charity barely two years old.
- Complete scoping for Firm Foundations and Parental Engagement projects: the research phase of these projects is well under way and piloting and development of the 'toolkits' for these projects is scheduled to be completed by the end of 2014.
- Expand practical work in schools and colleges through National Numeracy Solutions, trading as National Mathematics Partnership (NMP), and disseminate evidence of what works. The work of NMP will provide valuable evidence to inform the work of National Numeracy.
- Continue the Raising Achievement project in London schools and disseminate findings.
- Hold further meetings of the Numeracy Forum, establishing it as key platform for debate and spread of ideas.
- Commission a further YouGov poll to continue our annual examination of public attitudes to numeracy.
- Continue to extend National Numeracy's influence and contact with government, including the devolved administrations, politicians and policy-makers, business, education and the media.
- Widen our support base and attract new funding in order to build activity further.

#### Reserves

As a young organisation experiencing significant growth, the Trustees are looking to establish free reserves of up to 2 years of 2013 unrestricted level expenditure in order to ensure the uninterrupted continuation of what is inevitably a long-term programme of work vital to the UK economy. This will also give the organisation some flexibility to respond to unforeseen opportunities as they arise in the early years. The trustees will regularly review the level of reserves and aim to establish a free reserve position of a year's expenditure when the annual budget has reached a more stable equilibrium.

#### TRUSTEES' RESPONSIBILITIES STATEMENT

#### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2013

#### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### 1.1 Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, with the exception of investments which are included at market value, and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008). The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP), 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities' published in March 2005, applicable accounting standards and the Companies Act 2006.

The Statement of financial activities (SOFA) and Balance sheet consolidate the financial statements of the company and its subsidiary undertaking. The results of the subsidiary are consolidated on a line by line basis.

No separate SOFA has been presented for the company alone as permitted by section 408 of the Companies Act 2006 and paragraph 397 of the SORP.

#### 1.2 Company status

The company is a company limited by guarantee. The members of the company are the Trustees named on page 1. In the event of the company being wound up, the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £1 per member of the company.

#### 1.3 Fund accounting

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the company and which have not been designated for other purposes.

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors or which have been raised by the company for particular purposes. The costs of raising and administering such funds are charged against the specific fund. The aim and use of each restricted fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.

Investment income, gains and losses are allocated to the appropriate fund.

#### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2013

#### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

#### 1.4 Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the consolidated statement of financial activities when the company has entitlement to the funds, certainty of receipt and the amount can be measured with sufficient reliability.

Gifts in kind donated for distribution are included at valuation and recognised as income when they are distributed to the projects. Gifts donated for resale are included as income when they are sold. Donated facilities are included at the value to the company where this can be quantified and a third party is bearing the cost. No amounts are included in the financial statements for services donated by volunteers.

Income tax recoverable in relation to donations received under Gift Aid or deeds of covenant is recognised at the time of the donation.

Other income is recognised in the period in which it is receivable and to the extent the goods have been provided or on completion of the service.

Grant received are treated in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities'. Grants are credited to the Statement of Financial Activities when receivable, unless they relate to a specified future period, in which case they are deferred..

#### 1.5 Resources expended

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been included under expense categories that aggregate all costs for allocation to activities. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular activities they have been allocated on a basis consistent with the use of the resources.

Support costs are those costs incurred directly in support of expenditure on the objects of the company and include project management carried out at Headquarters. Governance costs are those incurred in connection with administration of the company and compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements.

All resources expended are inclusive of irrecoverable VAT.

#### 1.6 Basis of consolidation

The financial statements consolidate the accounts of National Numeracy and all of its subsidiary undertakings ('subsidiaries').

The results of subsidiaries acquired during the year are included from the effective date of acquisition.

The company has taken advantage of the exemption contained within 408 of the Companies Act 2006 not to present its own income and expenditure account.

The income and expenditure account for the year dealt with in the accounts of the company was a deficit of £38,131 (2012 surplus - £490,754).

#### 1.7 Intangible fixed assets and amortisation

Goodwill is the difference between amounts paid on the acquisition of a business and the fair value of the identifiable assets and liabilities. It is amortised in the consolidated statement of financial activities over its estimated economic life.

#### 1.8 Investments

Investments are stated at market value at the balance sheet date. The Statement of financial activities includes the net gains and losses arising on revaluations and disposals throughout the year.

Investments in subsidiaries are valued at cost less provision for impairment.

#### 1.9 Pensions

The company operates a defined contribution pension scheme and the pension charge represents the amounts payable by the company to the fund in respect of the year.
